President's Perch

When I wrote my President's Perch articles in October and December of last year, little did I realize that my predictions of irruptive species and "winning the bird-feeder lottery" would indeed happen in my own back yard. As most of you know, Jean and I hosted a first-year male Bullock's Oriole from February 10 through March 17. This is not only a first time bird for Harford County, it is only the third documented record for Maryland, and the first to visit a feeder where bird chasers like me could come and see the bird. To show what an unusual season it has been, there were also Bullock's Orioles at feeders in Connecticut, Pennsylvania, North Carolina and Georgia.

So, yes, we feel like we won the lottery because we did nothing differently this season than in past years. The excitement began on Monday, February 11 when I happened to notice a flash of yellow, black, and white on a larger than finch-sized bird. Given the northern irruptive year, my first thought was Evening Grosbeak, a bird that would certainly be an exciting visitor, as I haven't seen one in Harford County for 30 years. Since I didn't have my binoculars around my neck, I tried to get closer to the feeder to examine the bird. I then could see that it wasn't a grosbeak but some kind of oriole.

By then the bird had flown and I needed to take some quick action. I first grabbed my binoculars and looked for the camera. I next found three field guides so that I could compare orioles. One would assume that any lingering winter oriole would be a Baltimore Oriole as there are plenty of records for this species in Maryland in the winter. As I was figuring out how to turn on and focus the camera, I was also looking at the field guides. My bird had a black chin and I was pretty sure that a Baltimore Oriole never has that plumage stage. My next thought was Orchard Oriole as the first year male is yellow-green with a black chin.

In due time, the bird returned to my feeder and I quickly tried to take some pictures with little success. So then I tried to study the bird's features with my binoculars. It didn't have color on the belly and the yellow color tended to be more orange than green, which eliminated the Orchard Oriole. I slowly came to the conclusion that the only logical fit was a first-year male Bullock's. One guide didn't even show this plumage, so it pays to have several different sources to consult. As I switched from just looking at pictures to actually reading the text, I became even more convinced that my identification was accurate.

My next steps were to start calling others who were better photographers than me and get other opinions to help verify my conclusion. Fortunately, Kim Hafner and Bob and Susan Hood were available to rush over and photograph the bird. Kim emailed pictures to Matt and he agreed with the identification. Then the fun began as we posted the sighting to the Maryland & DC birding website. That afternoon brought about 10 visitors and people continued to come for most of the next five weeks. I tried to keep a list of visitors but probably missed many. By my count, more than 175 enjoyed seeing the bird and adding it to one or more of their lists.

Some days the bird only showed up once and other days it came almost hourly. Why is it here and where did it spend the rest of the winter? Where else does it go to feed? Could it have been here all winter and I just didn't notice? The Bullock's in Pennsylvania is back for a third winter. Will my bird return next year? I used to tell my science teachers that teaching is not about getting them to give the right answers but getting them to ask the right questions. I like surprises and I like to investigate questions and discover something that the books don't tell me. I especially like to share my "lottery winnings" and I have made many new birding friends as a result of this experience. Not a bad way to spend a winter! Thanks Mr. Oriole for selecting my yard and sharing some excitement with me and my friends. You are welcome to come back next year. ~ *Dennis Kirkwood*

June Challenge!

The June Challenge is an event started by the Alachua Audubon Society in Florida. The purpose is to get more people birding in the month of June, but I also feel it will be a great way to better understand birds in Harford County. For example, the last two years, I have lead a June field trip for the bird club traversing the entire county and I've been surprised not to see a single gull species all day. Are there really no gulls in the county in June? Were we just unlucky? The Breeding Bird Atlas Project is over, but that doesn't mean we know all about the breeding birds of Harford County. Anyone know where to find Red-headed Woodpeckers? Vesper Sparrows? Northern Bobwhite?

How to participate? Go birding in Harford County in June! Everyone is welcome and I encourage everyone to get out there. I am leading a June Challenge kick-off trip on June 1st where we will try to find some of the more uncommon breeding species in the county and look for a few late migrants and rarities found by the conference. So if you go birding in June simply send your sightings to me (or better yet, use the club listserv and ebird!) and I will keep a tally of all the species reported to the county in June. If you see a species listed as rare or accidental in summer in the Harford County Checklist

(www.harfordbirdclub.org/HarfordChecklist.pdf), please include a couple sentences on the location and identification. People may want to chase it! I will post weekly updates to the listserv on the progress and try to include some suggestions on where to find new species.

At the end of the month, send me your list (hafner.matt@gmail.com) and I will publish the results of the first ever Harford County June Challenge!

At the March 1 dinner meeting, the club continued the tradition of recognizing members and friends who have made a special contribution to our organization during the past year. We wish to thank Joy Aso of the Montgomery MOS chapter for her beautiful certificates that she created this year for each awardee.

The first award was **Birder of the Year**, presented to Les Eastman for his many contributions to our club. Les has served as Vice-President in the past, regularly leads field trips, and hosts an annual "Hummingbird Happy Hour" in August when his 25+ feeders are humming with action. He has been the creator and manager of our website since the 1990s and also edits and compiles our newsletter, *Wrenderings*. With all this activity on behalf of the club, it is only appropriate that he also gets many outstanding birds to visit his feeders. Congratulations Les!

The next award was **Volunteer of the Year**, presented to Eileen Nack for her long-time service in organizing the dinner meetings, including preparing nametags, collecting the money, coordinating with the Women's Society at the church, and any other duties as assigned. She is a very willing worker and an extremely pleasant lady. For all these generous gifts of time and talent, we thank you and congratulate you Eileen!

Our **Rookie of the Year** was presented to Josh Emm of Havre de Grace. Josh got turned on to birding this past fall and has been a regular attendee on most field trips and club events. He regularly reports his findings on the Maryland and Harford List Serves and often accompanies the reports with beautiful photos. His excitement and enthusiasm are contagious. Best wishes Josh and congratulations!

Our **Local Lister of the Year** was awarded to our Vice-President Matt Hafner for seeing 229 species in Harford County during 2012, believed to be the second highest Harford big year count. Matt is one of the state's most active field birders, leading trips throughout the state and even on the Atlantic Ocean as a pelagic bird trip organizer and leader. We are fortunate to have him and his wife, Kim, back in Harford County and involved with the Harford Bird Club. Congratulations Matt! In addition this year, President Dennis Kirkwood was recognized for reaching 2000 World Life Birds during his summer trip to Peru.

Our final award is **Bird of the Year**. This award is centered on a bird but also recognizes the discoverer and/or host of the species for their hospitality to bird and birders. Because 2012 was another good year for new birds to Harford (several species were added to the County all-time list), the executive board had a tough choice. Our recipient was the Rahll Family of Fallston who hosted several (we think 3) Henslow's Sparrows in their farm field this past April and May. Kim and Matt Hafner are neighbors of the Rahlls and discovered the singing males. When approached, the Rahlls gave permission for visiting birders to enter and observe the birds. This species was once more common in central Maryland but has not been present for about 50 years. We have high hopes that the birds will return and possibly establish themselves once again locally. The Rahlls were unable to be at the March meeting but we hope to be able to present their award at our May gathering. Thank you for your hospitality and preservation of open space and grassland habitat.

Harford Birdlife

Harford County had a good winter for birds this year. Let's hope spring is just as good. This report covers the period from January 26th through March 29th, 2013.

Geese, Swans, Ducks

DK had a **Cackling Goose** and a blue **Snow Goose** at Turney's Pond in northern Harford County through most of the period. TH found 15 **Northern Shovelers** at Swan Harbor on March 15th. He saw 13 there on March 26th. SH saw a male **Redhead** on a pond near Tollgate Road on Feb 13th. It was still there on Feb 27th. BM saw one on the Susquehanna River on Mar 2nd, along with several **scaup**. JE identified a **Greater Scaup** on the river on Feb 18th. DL saw 4 at Lakeside on Mar 17th. LE saw a mixed flock of about 200 **Greater** and **Lesser Scaup** from Lapidum on Feb 20th. He saw 50-60 more near the Rock Run mill. JoH and JE saw a **White-winged Scoter** on the river near Lapidum on Mar 17th. JE saw a female **Red-breasted Merganser** from the Havre de Grace waterfront on Feb 18th and 21st. GF found one at Lakeside on Mar 23rd. PP had a **Ruddy Duck** at Mariner Point Park on Feb 18th.

Hawks, Falcons

JE saw his first **Osprey** of the year over the Susquehanna River on Mar 14th. JAS saw two near the APG-South airfield on Mar 15th. LB had a **Bald Eagle** spend a few days in late February on the ground in and around her Bel Air yard before it moved on. SH saw a pair of **Red-shouldered Hawks** mating in her yard on Feb 15th. LE saw an **American Kestrel** near the intersection of Rock Run and Craig's Corner Roads on Mar 12th.

Woodcocks, Gulls, Hummingbirds

TH found 3-4 **American Woodcocks** near Beard's Hill Road in Aberdeen at sunset on Feb 20th. He saw and heard 3-4 others at the former Swan Creek Country Club on Feb 21st. MH found a **Little Gull** over the river near Lapidum on Mar 18th. JoH and JE saw a **Black-headed Gull** in the same general area on Mar 17th. DL noted about 75 **Ring-billed Gulls** and a **Herring Gull** at Lakeside on Mar 3rd. LE hosted a wayward first year male **Rufous Hummingbird** at his home near Havre de Grace all winter. By the end of March, it had almost completely molted into its breeding plumage.



Thrushes, Thrasher, Longspur, Blackbird, Oriole, Finches

JH saw a flock of **Eastern Bluebirds** near her Bel Air home on Mar 3rd. DB had a **Hermit Thrush** in her Street birdbath Mar 23rd-26th. JE saw an early **Brown Thrasher** in Perryman on Feb 18th. MH found a **Lapland Longspur** near Bradenbaugh Rd on Mar 25th. JE saw about 65 **Rusty Blackbirds** near Clubhouse Road in Perryman on Feb 18th. DK hosted an immature male **Bullock's Oriole** at his home in northern Harford County from Feb 11th through Mar 17th. Over 175 people came to his home during this time to see this beautiful bird. SH saw 5 **White-winged Crossbills** near her Fallston home on Feb 11th. MH saw 6 in the same place on Mar 3rd. JE and LE saw a **Common Redpoll** at LE's feeder on Mar 4th and 5th. There were also several **Pine Siskins** there throughout the period.

April 20 (Sat.) – Susquehanna State Park. An ideal time to enjoy emerging wildflowers, early migrant songbirds, and lingering winter visitors. Field Trip Reports

Loch Raven

February 24

It was a beautiful late winter's day; sunny with temperatures in the mid 40's. Eight of us walked the Loch Raven watershed, first taking the path through woodland to the fisherman's dock and then partially retracing our steps through woodland down the peninsula to the reservoir again. On our woodland walk we encountered a number of mixed flocks of small birds; **nuthatches**, **Carolina Chickadees**, both **Golden-crowned** and **Ruby-crowned Kinglets**, **Eastern Bluebird** and five species of **woodpecker** including **Hairy**. Sparrows were not plentiful and **Chipping Sparrow** was a good find. On the reservoir, while duck were not abundant, seven species were identified along with **Hooded Merganser** and **Pied-billed Grebe** both of which were present in numbers. Overall 47 species were identified.

Gunpowder Waterfowl Trip

March 16, 2013

The weather forecast threatened of rain and snow, so four of us went onto APG-North to scope out waterfowl because low pressure systems seem to favor birds on the water. It remained cloudy all day with soft rain mid-morning. Luckily the winds were calm and the water was like glass. Rafts of **Lesser** and **Greater Scaup** were found off Hoadley Road as well were **Tundra Swans**, **Common Mergansers**, and **Ruddy Ducks**. **Bald Eagles** were seen throughout the day. Dr. Bob Werrlein spied a very nice **Red-throated Loon** up close off of Kings Creek that afforded an excellent chance for observation. As we were on fire, we went to Perryman to see what was at the ponds on

Ford Lane. On the way, **Horned Larks** danced over the hood of my van, splitting off and landing about 10m equidistant from my van on either side allowing very close looks for observers in all seats. The ponds had little water but the trip allowed us to pick up **American Kestrel** and **Northern Harrier**.



A recently deceased white-tailed deer had more than 40 **Black Vultures** attracted by it and we observed as they worked through the carcass. A quick pass by the marsh on Rt. 40 across from Home Depot was also productive where we picked up **American Wigeon**, **Gadwall**, and the resident **Mute Swan**. We accumulated 57 species for the day and really didn't want to stop. ~ Mark S. Johnson

Eden Mill Nature Center

March 23

Nine birders gathered at Eden Mill eager to shed the lingering BLAHS of winter. In a good start, we were greeted by a pair of **Hooded Mergansers**, a rising **Red-tailed Hawk**. a cacophony of **Canada Geese**, a drumming of resident **woodpeckers**, and signature songs of waking passerines. The air was crisp and still, the sky was blue and nearly cloudless, and the morning sun accented the brilliant colors of every showy plumage. Near the mill, **Pileated Woodpeckers** put their great size and flaming red crests on review. We walked for 3.5 hrs on riparian, marshy and woodland trails which were frequently quiet, but came alive at intervals with passing groups of skulking sparrows, a drilling **Yellow-bellied Sapsucker**, foraging **White- & Red-breasted Nuthatches**, a **Brown Creeper**, and **Yellow-rumped Warblers**.
