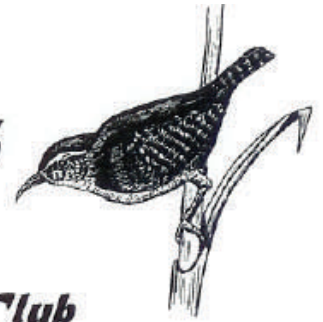

President's Perch: Spring is Almost Here!

Seventy degrees one week, icy and twenty the next... Maryland winter has arrived... granted just in time for spring to hit next week! I always think at this time of year how challenging this must be for birds (God knows it is mighty tough on bird watchers!). Despite the oscillating weather of the past month, January and early February have been a great time for the Harford Bird Club. Dave Ziolkowski's presentation at the January meeting was very well received, and we had what I am guessing was the 2nd highest raffle earnings probably in club history (2nd only to the January meeting one year ago; January must be a good time to raffle things!). The feeder tour went well with 13 attending in addition to Marcia Watson who co-lead the trip from Cecil County and Tom and Nancy Congersky who hosted a stop. A great time for all with a very cooperative Red-shouldered Hawk and a flock of Snow Geese stopping by! He watched the Swallow fly towards the lighthouse but didn't spot it again.

Geese, Ducks, Gamebird, Heron

Three Cackling Geese are still at Turney's Pond (DK). RR saw a Northern Shoveler at Bynum Pond on Nov 11th. At Lakeside DL kept an eye on the comings and goings of the Ring-necked Ducks. There was 1 on Nov 11th, 4 on Nov 24th and 1 on Dec 9th. RC saw a flock of 14 Wild Turkey's at Edgewood Arsenal for almost three weeks in Nov. While MDDW were hiking at Broad Creek Boy Scout Camp they came across a flock of 25 Wild Turkeys. LD saw a Great Blue Heron fly into his small pond in Bright Oaks on Nov 4th and then walked to the stream at the back of his property.

Hawks, Owls, Kingfisher

LE saw 38 Bald Eagles at the Conowingo Dam on Nov 9th. Other places Bald Eagles were seen include Havre de Grace (LE, MoH), Rocks State Park (DB), Turney's Pond (DK) and Lakeside (DL). On Nov 12th RC saw a Northern Harrier flying over the fields of Creswell. CW saw a Cooper's Hawk in Havre de Grace on Nov 28th. RC saw one in Bel Air on Dec 6th. MoH spotted an American Kestrel at Swan Harbor on Nov 2nd. A Merlin was seen hunting the fields of Edgewood Arsenal on Nov 7th and Nov 14th (RC). A Barred Owl was calling in DB's backyard on Nov 29th. MW found a Northern Saw-Whet Owl dead on the side of Paradise Road on Nov 5th. DW saw 2 Belted Kingfishers while on the Joe K Trail in Havre de Grace on Dec 30th.

Woodpeckers

A Red-Headed Woodpecker was spotted by DK in his pasture on Dec 6th. RC saw 2 Red-bellied Woodpeckers, 1 Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, 2 Downy Woodpeckers and 1 Hairy Woodpecker in Bel Air on Dec 6th. At Susquehanna State Park on Nov 12th LE counted 5 Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers. SBH watched 2 Pileated Woodpeckers in their backyard of Fallston on Dec 5th. DW saw 2 while hiking on the Joe K Trail in Havre de Grace.

Titmice, Nuthatch, Wren

JS saw a Black-capped Chickadee while birding in Perryman on Dec 1st. Red-breasted Nuthatches were spotted all over the county. LD was the first to document them at his feeder on Nov 2nd in Bright Oaks, Bel Air. Then LE watched 2 at his feeder in Havre de Grace on Nov 9th. RC saw 3 at his feeder in Creswell on Nov 10th. On Nov 11 DL saw a couple on his feeder in Abingdon and MoH saw 1 in Havre de Grace. RC then saw 2 on his feeder in Bel Air on Dec 6th. PP watched one on his feeder in Joppatowne on Dec 30th and DW had one eating at his feeder the same day. DK reported seeing them throughout December. MoH saw 1 Carolina Wren in Havre de Grace on Nov 8th.



INTERESTING FACT: The wide-spread use of the pesticide DDT is well known to have caused declines in many birds of prey and wading birds, perhaps most famously the Peregrine Falcon. The Peregrine has made great strides however following the banning of DDT and reintroduction efforts. Amazingly, the place where one can be most assured of seeing a Peregrine Falcon: according to the NY State Department of Environmental Conservation has predicted New York City has the largest concentration of Peregrine Falcons anywhere on the planet! In fact, at least one pair nests on every Hudson River bridge from Albany to the ocean!

Kinglet, Thrush, Pipit, Warbler

At Susquehanna State Park LE spotted a Ruby-crowned Kinglet on Nov 12th. PP counted 2 while birding in Joppatowne on Dec 30th. On Nov 22nd CW counted 7 Eastern Bluebirds on a wire at Susquehanna State Park. SBH put mealworms out for the local Fallston Eastern Bluebirds on Dec 7th and got to watch 6 enjoy their treat. While at work on Nov 14th SM watched 100 American Pipits land in a grassy field. RC saw 2 in Edgewood playing in a puddle along side the road. A Palm Warbler was reported by DL at Lakeside on Nov 4th.

Sparrows

Two Eastern Towhees, 2 Chipping Sparrows and many White-throated Sparrows were spotted by RC in Bel Air on Dec 6th. DW saw a Chipping Sparrow while birding in Glenville on Dec 28th. DL reported from Lakeside 5 Field Sparrows on Nov 24th, 2 Savannah Sparrows on Nov 4th, 14 Song Sparrows on Nov 24th, 2 Swamp Sparrows on Nov 11th, Nov 24th, and Dec 9th and 2 White-throated Sparrows on Nov 24th. MoH saw in Havre de Grace White-throated Sparrows on Nov 11th, Nov 14th, and Nov 15th, Dec 16th. DK had a lot of White-crowned Sparrows at his feeder on Nov 22nd.

Finches

This was the winter for finches! Purple Finches were reported by LD on Nov 2nd (Bel Air), LE on Nov 14th (Havre de Grace), DK on Nov 22nd (his feeder), ARK on Nov 24th (at feeder) and DW on Dec 30th (Webster). House finches were reported by MoH on Nov 8th, Dec 15th (Havre de Grace) and ARK on Nov 24th (at feeder). DL was the only one to report seeing a Common Redpoll (Abingdon Dec 22). Pine Siskens invaded our county on Nov 2nd and the last to be reported was on Nov 24th. The reports came in as follows – LD on Nov 2nd (Bel Air), LE on Nov 4th, Nov 8th, Nov 9th, Nov 11th (Havre de Grace), DL on Nov 5th, Nov 21st, (Abingdon), RC on Nov 10th (Creswell), MoH on Nov 10th, Nov 11th, Nov 14th, Nov 15th (Havre de Grace), DK on Nov 22nd (his feeder), ARK on Nov 24th (at feeder). American Goldfinches heard about the feeders and didn't want to be left out so their reports are as follows – DL on Nov 5th (Abingdon), LE on Nov 8th, Nov 9th, Nov 11th (Havre de Grace) and MoH on Nov 8th, Nov 10th, Nov 11th, Nov 14th, Nov 15th (Havre de Grace).

Field Trip Reports

Loch Raven Reservoir: December 15th, 2007 by Don Soubie

Five birders traveled to Loch Raven Reservoir on chilly, damp and cloudy December morning. The water in the reservoir is very low but good numbers of waterfowl were present. Ring-necked Duck, Pintail, Bufflehead and Hooded Merganser highlighted the waterfowl sightings. Other birds seen during the morning trip included Bald Eagle, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Red-Breasted Nuthatch and Cedar Waxwing. A total of 41 species were observed.

Conowingo Gull Watch: January 20th, 2008 by Dave Webb

On a bitterly cold and windy January morning, 4 fearless birders met at Conowingo Dam for a gull watch. In recent years, Conowingo has lost some of its luster as a gull watcher's paradise. However, this morning was a throwback to the dam's glory days, as a strong flow through 8 or so flood gates attracted thousands of gulls to the "Great Fish Cuisinart of the Susquehanna". Despite the abundance of gulls, we were unable to find anything but Ring-bills, Herrings and Great Black-backs -- a distant Bonaparte's Gull was only spotted by one observer. The highlight of the trip was not just one, but two(!) Peregrine Falcons seen throughout the morning perched atop the electrical supports, hunting Rock Pigeons, and on one occasion being harassed by a brazen flock of four American Crows. Other noteworthy birds were Common and Hooded Mergansers, American Black Duck, and plenty of Bald Eagles. As the wind intensified making it more difficult for us to keep warm, the trip was adjourned not even three hours old and with only 19 species recorded.

Sunday, February 24

Loch Raven. Join veteran leaders Dave Larkin and Lynn Davis to explore one of Baltimore's most scenic waterscapes. Just six miles north of downtown Towson, this water reservoir and its surrounding forest is a magnet for pine-loving songbirds and waterfowl. Wednesdays, March 12 and 19

Oodles of Timberdoodles. When these odd birds fly, we want to be there to see this bizarre spectacle—so come to one or both of these Timberdoodle watches. Meet at the Aberdeen Wal-Mart at 6:30 pm. Leaders Colleen Webster and Susan and Bob Hood will take you to the site.

Saturday, March 15

Harford Waterfowl Tour. Randy Robertson and Jean Wheeler lead the search for our spring visitors, those web-footed, heavy-bodied birds. The Susquehanna Flats offer good looks at many migrating ducks and their near cousins. Meet at Tydings Marina at 8:00 am. Contact Jean at (410) 879-7424 for more information.

Saturday, March 29

Swan Harbor Farms. This small but significant park on the Oakington Peninsula offers 469 acres of bay side rolling farmland, undeveloped woodland, and brushy meadows. Possibility for Bald Eagle, Wilson's Snipe, a good mix of ducks, and wintering sparrows. Join caretaker John Gallo and Tom Gibson at the park headquarters at the end of the entrance road at 8:00 AM. Saturday, April 5

Harford Glen. Experience the Glen at its peak as leader Carol Flora guides you through the marshes, fields, and forests of this perennial club favorite. Always a productive location, an impressive species list including shorebirds, warblers, and other songbirds is certain. Meet at the parking lot just north of the dormitories at 7:30 AM. Call Carol at (410) 638-8220 for more information.

Sunday, April 13

Perryman. Explore this locally popular birding destination well known for its large fields and bayside access. The timing of this trip presents a great opportunity to find Wilson's Snipe, Horned Lark, American Pipit, Savannah Sparrow and a good mix of puddle ducks. Friday, April 18

6 36th Annual Rock Run Christmas Bird Count



The Rock Run Christmas Bird Count was held on Saturday December 29, 2007 and 43 birders took to the field in search of all things feathered. Very early owling was affected by rain and fog. But the rain stopped early enough for some hardy birders to successfully locate all 4 Owl species. Yes, N. Saw-whet was found! The weather improved remarkably with morning fog and clouds giving way to a clear and mild afternoon. The winds that were predicted never developed. Peter Jay donated the use of his boat again, and our crew was on the River. Purple

Finches were seen in good numbers but once again many common species were hard to find. We had a Golden Eagle, Peregrine, Merlin, Wild Turkey, Baltimore Oriole and a Wilson's Snipe. We ended the day with an unbelievable 104 species.

Nine groups went owling. Six groups were successful. We found our three usual suspects and 2 Saw-whet. We had 18 Eastern Screech-owl. Woodpeckers, all except the Red-headed, seemed to be everywhere. We had a reported 72 Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, 59 Hairy and 213 N. Flicker. In this northern finch irruption year, 71 Purple Finch were counted by 7 of 15 groups and 172 White-breasted Nuthatch were tallied.

1. **Oakwood:** Marcia Watson, Monroe Harden & Ruth Bergstrom (47 species). A Golden Eagle, the first in many years and a Merlin were great finds for this team.
2. **Rowlandville:** Les Eastman & Wyatt Wallace (51 Species) This veteran team exceeded their species count for last year. Good birds included Eastern Screech-owl (6) and Lesser Scaup.
3. **Colora:** Tom Congersky, Randy Robertson, Cynthia & Rupert Rosetti (42 species) Another team which exceeded last year's count. They found Tundra Swan, Pied-billed Grebe, Double-crested Cormorant.
4. **Bainbridge:** Matt & Kim Hafner (67 species). Returning to Harford Co. for the count, this couple was tied for third highest count of the day. They found a Baltimore Oriole, the first in many years & the only Chipping Sparrow (5) for the count.
5. **Perrypoint:** Russ & Annie Kovach (67 species) Our President and his bride had the only Snow Geese & Pine Siskin on the count and they were one of two groups spotting Peregrine.
6. **Swan Creek:** John Gallo & George Yorkston (64 species) This dynamic duo bested last year's tally by 12 species. They had the sole Pine Warbler & were one of only 3 groups finding Killdeer. With 337 they had the most Robins in the count.
7. **Havre de Grace:** Rick Cheicante, Dave Larkin & Peter Lev (69 species) – This experienced team had the 2nd highest count of the day & found the only Green-winged Teal, N. Pintail & Gadwall. They found the mother load of Savannah Sparrow (69) and they were 1 of 2 teams to spot Lesser Black-backed Gull.
- Aldino:** Phil Powers, John Taylor, Elaine Beery & Terry Haley (47 species). This hardworking team found 6 species of raptors and 6 species of woodpeckers. They counted 27 E. Bluebird.
9. **Susquehanna:** Mark Johnson & Suzanne Procell (56 species). These veterans found Tundra Swan, Brown Creeper & both Kinglets. Purple Finch was seen at Marian Argentino's feeder in the sector.
- 10 **Rolling Green:** Dave Webb & Jean Wheeler (54 species). This veteran pair found 1 of the N. Saw-whet Owls and a plethora of E. Bluebird (57), American Pipit (11) & Purple Finch (36). Ann Helton conducted her annual feeder watch in this sector.
- 11 a. **Deer Creek:** Colleen Webster, Lynn Feryus, Tom Leckey & David Farner (43species). Some good finds include Sharp-shinned Hawk, Red-shouldered Hawk. They were 1 of only 4 groups spotting Gray Catbird.
- 11 b. **Darlington** Jay Killian, Paul Zelenka, & Andrew Becker (44 species) Welcome to a new team of observers who found the only Eastern Phoebe (2) on the count.

I Ic. Conowingo Dam: Gene Scarpula (36species). Once again we had Maryland’s premier Gull expert at the dam. If we could only get the large variety of gulls back too! He spotted 4 gull species, Double-crested Cormorant, & Black Vulture (312).

12. Dublin: Dave Ziolkowski, Beth Olson, Nacole Wilson. (72 species) – Covering new territory for them, this team turned in the highest count for the day. They had N. Saw-whet Owl, Canvasback & 7 species of birds of prey including N. Harrier.

13. River Flats: Dennis & Kristin Kirkwood, Sarah & Peter Jay, Grace Hiter, Volney Ford (56 species) Peter Jay’s boat was in the water again this year. This seasoned team found most of the expected waterfowl plus the only Black-crowned night Heron of the count. Their bonus bird was Wilson’s Snipe!

The 36th Rock Run CBC was a great success but once again it was hard to find species like Harrier, Killdeer and Meadowlark This year will be remembered for the Golden Eagle and high counts of Black Vulture, Eagle, Coopers Hawk, Red-shouldered Hawk, Sapsuckers, Hairy Woodpeckers, Flickers, Purple Finch and White-breasted Nuthatch. Thanks to all who participated. We had lots of new faces on the count and all the sectors were well covered. Once again we ended the count at Lorna Wortman’s for hot stew and a scrumptious selection of homemade breads. Thank you **Lorna and Adele** for hosting the “tally rally”.Next year’s CBC will be on **Sunday December 28, 2008. Mark your calendars!**

Saturday, April 26

Susquehanna State Park. Enjoy the early spring wildflowers and migrant songbirds that have made this State Park so popular with local naturalists. 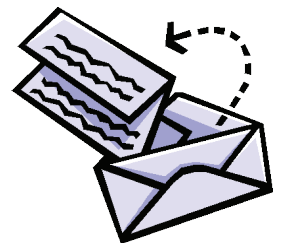
