## President's Perch

Earlier this year, I stepped out of my office building during a lunch break, and from the back side of a line of boxwood shrubs heard a rapid series of somewhat raspy chipping notes. My first thought was "Oh brother, another cowbird chick." Although I detest cowbirds for the effect that their nest parasitism has on native songbird populations, I do enjoy tracking down the youngsters to see which species have been duped.

I was relieved to see not a cowbird, but rather a young Chipping Sparrow under a holly tree chasing after one of its parents. The parent sparrow fed feverishly from the ground, and occasionally dropped food into the eager mouth of its offspring. Unaided by binoculars, I was close enough to see the adult's tell-tale rusty cap, narrow black eyeline, unmarked light breast, and slightly notched tail. "Lil Chip" was similarly marked, but lacked the rusty cap and had a few streaks on its chest.

Two days later, Lil Chip and *both* parents were back again. Whether the parents were beneath the holly, on the lower limbs of a mature oak, in the tall grasses alongside a fence, or underneath a parked car, Lil Chip was always close behind, begging incessantly for its next morsel and entirely dependent upon them for food.

Chipping Sparrows are a very common breeding species in our area, and finding young Chippies either in the nest or as fledglings is not too difficult a challenge. What makes this sighting noteworthy is that these observations were not made during the late spring or summer but rather on October 5 and 7! According to Bob Ringler, co-author of *Field List of the Birds of Maryland* (aka, "The Yellow Book"), this is the latest record ever of a dependent Chipping Sparrow in Maryland.

The tale of Lil Chip exemplifies "citizen science" in which amateur ornithologists across the globe document information about the distribution, behavior and life cycle of birds. Christmas Bird Counts (CBCs) are another example of citizen science. During a CBC, teams of birders scour fields, forests and rivers, counting birds of all species. Over time, CBC data provides valuable information about abundance trends of our wintering birds. (continued on page 2)

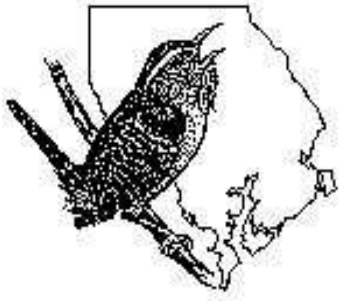
**Dave Ziolkowski to Headline November Dinner Meeting**

Make plans now to attend the Friday, November 5<sup>th</sup> dinner meeting at Churchville Presbyterian Church when our guest speaker will be longtime club member Dave Ziolkowski. Dave has been a loyal member of the Harford Bird Club since his days at Joppatowne High School and now, after more than 20 years of field experience, he serves as the program biologist for the Department of Interior's North American Breeding Bird Survey. We've known it for a long time, but in recent years Dave has earned national recognition as a dynamic and entertaining speaker, and he returns now to share tales from a recent research expedition with the Smithsonian to Gabon, Central Africa.

A nation the size of Colorado located just south of Cameroon, Gabon is one of the few countries in the world stable enough to avoid coverage in the world press yet still largely unknown to both the tourist and scientific communities. This fact isn't too surprising in light of the sparse to absent infrastructure found throughout this relatively pristine African landscape. Over 70% of the country is covered in dense rainforest with the remainder in savanna and coastline, and for each of these habitats Gabon has the wildlife to match. The bird list is estimated in excess of 670 regularly occurring species and in few other places in the world can one expect to watch Gorillas and Elephants sharing the same beach. Recognizing the great environmental importance of, and paucity of biological information about these Gabonese ecosystems, the Smithsonian Institution has partnered with the country to explore and inventory its natural resources. Dave's presentation gives us a rare view into the world of modern ornithological exploration, as he recounts the wildlife and adventures that he and two Smithsonian colleagues experienced while prospecting this dynamic landscape for new species of birds.

# Harford Birdlife

Early fall migration included some new and exciting visitors. This month's column covers the period from August 8th through October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2010.

## Ducks, Herons, Hawks, Falcons

DL and PL saw a **Gadwall**, a **Green-winged Teal**, and a **Hooded Merganser** at Perryman Park on Sep 25<sup>th</sup>. MJ noted the adult female **Hooded Merganser** at that location on Aug 24<sup>th</sup>. RB and TH saw a **Red-breasted Merganser** at Harford Glen on Sep 18<sup>th</sup>. KG and BC reported a **Ruddy Duck** at Swan Harbor on Aug 25<sup>th</sup>. RB counted at least 20 **Great Egrets** at Harford Glen on Aug 14<sup>th</sup>. KG heard a **Green Heron** from his Jarrettsville yard on Aug 26<sup>th</sup>. DL saw one at Lakeside on Sep 26<sup>th</sup>.

RO saw a **Northern Harrier** at Swan Harbor on Aug 8<sup>th</sup>. RB and TH had single **Sharp-shinned** and **Cooper's Hawks** at Harford Glen on Sep 18<sup>th</sup>. DK noted several **Cooper's Hawks** and up to 7 **American Kestrels** on and around his farm in the northern part of the county throughout September. DW saw 2 **Broad-winged Hawks** over Webster Village on Sep 15<sup>th</sup>.

## Plovers, Sandpipers, Terns

DL had a **Semipalmated Plover** at Perryman Park on Sep 15<sup>th</sup>, along with a **Greater Yellowlegs**, a **Lesser Yellowlegs**, and **Spotted, Western, Stilt**, and **Least Sandpipers**. He and PL saw 5 **Western Sandpipers** there on Sep 25<sup>th</sup>. JM had 4 on Sep 7<sup>th</sup>. MO found a **Red-necked Phalarope** there on Sep 6<sup>th</sup>. Several others saw and photographed the bird that day. KG reported an **American Woodcock** flying over his Jarrettsville home the evening of Aug 26<sup>th</sup>.

KG and BC saw 2 **Caspian** and 36 **Forsters Terns** at Swan Harbor on Aug 25<sup>th</sup>. RB and TH saw a single **Caspian Tern** at Harford Glen on Sep 18<sup>th</sup>.

## Cuckoos, Owls, Goatsuckers, Hummingbirds

TH saw a **Black-billed Cuckoo** near Rock Run Mill in Susquehanna State Park on Sep 20<sup>th</sup>. He also saw a **Yellow-billed Cuckoo** at Ladew Gardens on Sep 29<sup>th</sup>. DW saw one in Webster Village on Sep 5<sup>th</sup>. KK saw a **Great Horned Owl** in the late afternoon of Sep 18<sup>th</sup> at the family farm in northern Harford County. DB had 2 **Barred Owls** at her home in Street on Sep 28<sup>th</sup>. KG saw

individual **Common Nighthawks** flying over his Jarrettsville home on Aug 30<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup>.

KG and BC saw single **Ruby-throated Hummingbirds** at the Rock Run Mill and at Swan Harbor on Aug 25<sup>th</sup>. LE had 3 at his home near Havre de Grace on Sep 30<sup>th</sup>.

## Woodpeckers, Flycatchers, Vireos, Nuthatches, Thrushes

RB saw a **Red-headed Woodpecker** flying over Harford Glen on Aug 14<sup>th</sup>. SH also saw one (a juvenile) in Fallston on Sep 18<sup>th</sup>. KG and BC reported single **Alder** and **Least Flycatchers** at Rock Run on Aug 25<sup>th</sup>. KG saw another **Least Flycatcher** in Jarrettsville on Sep 3<sup>rd</sup>. KG and BC also saw a **Yellow-throated** and 4 **Red-eyed Vireos** at Rock Run on Aug 25<sup>th</sup>. DW saw a **Blue-headed Vireo** in Webster Village on Sep 5<sup>th</sup>. RB and TH had a **Warbling Vireo** at Harford Glen on Sep 18<sup>th</sup>. MJ reported a **Philadelphia Vireo** at the Eden Mill banding station on Sep 24<sup>th</sup>. This was the first one in ten years banding there.

RB heard a **Red-breasted Nuthatch** at Harford Glen on Aug 29<sup>th</sup>. AK and RK saw one in Darlington on Sep 6<sup>th</sup>. TH saw a **Ruby-crowned Kinglet** and a **Swainson's Thrush** at Ladew Gardens on Sep 29<sup>th</sup>. DB had a **Wood Thrush** at Rocks State Park on Sep 22<sup>nd</sup>.

## Wood Warblers

KG and BC saw 1 **Blue-winged**, 2 **Black-and-White**, and 2 **Prothonotary Warblers** at Rock Run on Aug 25<sup>th</sup>. RB and TH saw a **Tennessee**, a **Black-throated Blue**, a **Palm**, and several **Black-throated Green Warblers** at Harford Glen on Sep 18<sup>th</sup>. DW had a **Nashville Warbler** in Webster Village on Sep 19<sup>th</sup>. RB saw a **Chestnut-sided**, 3 **Magnolia**, a **Black-throated Blue**, 4 **Black-and-White**, and 5 **American Redstart Warblers** at Harford Glen on Aug 29<sup>th</sup>. LD saw a **Yellow-rumped Warbler** in the Bright Oaks area of Bel Air on Aug 20<sup>th</sup>. MJ had **Canada Warblers** at the Eden Mill banding station on Sep 10<sup>th</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>. DW heard one singing in Webster Village on Sep 5<sup>th</sup>.

## Grosbeaks, Orioles

MJ reported 2 **Rose-breasted Grosbeaks** at the Eden Mill banding station on Sep 17<sup>th</sup>. RB and TH saw one at Harford Glen on Sep 18<sup>th</sup>, while SH also saw one in Fallston that same day. DK saw an immature one at Eden Mill on Sep 29<sup>th</sup>. KG and BC reported 2 **Blue Grosbeaks** and 4 **Indigo Buntings** at the Susquehanna State Park picnic area on Aug 25<sup>th</sup>. They also saw 2 **Bobolinks** and 135 **Red-winged Blackbirds** at Swan Harbor that day. They also had 2 **Orchard Orioles** at Lapidum and a **Baltimore Oriole** at Rock Run. DW saw a **Baltimore Oriole** in Webster Village on Sep 5<sup>th</sup>.

## Birds and Butterflies at Harford Glen

August 22<sup>nd</sup>. Showers threatened to cancel the walk before it began, but by 9 AM the rains stopped and the sun was peeping through the clouds. Butterfly expert Terry Haley and 7 other birding and butterfly enthusiasts enjoyed a delightful morning. Only 29 bird species were seen. The real stars were the dragonflies and butterflies. As for the dragonflies, the most memorable were the **Halloween Pendants** on the top of the dike that surrounds the fish pond. They were all perched on the stalks of grass that line the top of the dike. Thank goodness no one cuts the grass on the back of the dike or we would have missed this spectacle! We also saw **Eastern Amberwings**, **Slatey Skimmer** and **Common Whitetails** and some **Eastern Forktail** damselflies in the grass.

The butterflies started flying about the same time as the dragonflies. There were **silver-spotted**, **least** and **sachem skippers**. Three kinds of **swallowtails** were found, **Eastern Tiger**, **Black** and **Spice Bush**. There were the common **Cabbage Whites**, **Clouded Sulphurs**, **Eastern tailed Blues**, **Pearl Crescents** and **Buckeyes** in the grass. We were able to find and differentiate between the **Monarchs** and their copy cats, the **Viceroy**s. We went over the bridge to the sandy part of the island and found **Commas** and a beautiful **Red Spotted Purple** with its wings shining in the sun. Also, we did see two moths, the beautiful **Ailanthus Webworm** and an amazing **Hummingbird Clearwing**, doing its best at pretending to be a bird! Terry is looking forward to doing this again next year.

# Harford Bird Club November Dinner Meeting

Adding a Pixel to the West African Bird Picture from Coastal Gabon”**
